

## Worksheet #2 Solutions

$$\textcircled{1} \quad \|\vec{v} + \vec{w}\|^2 + \|\vec{v} - \vec{w}\|^2 =$$

$$(\vec{v} + \vec{w}) \cdot (\vec{v} + \vec{w}) + (\vec{v} - \vec{w}) \cdot (\vec{v} - \vec{w}) =$$

$$\vec{v} \cdot \vec{v} + 2\vec{v} \cdot \vec{w} + \vec{w} \cdot \vec{w} + \vec{v} \cdot \vec{v} - 2\vec{v} \cdot \vec{w} + \vec{w} \cdot \vec{w} =$$

$$2\vec{v} \cdot \vec{v} + 2\vec{w} \cdot \vec{w} =$$

$$2\|\vec{v}\|^2 + 2\|\vec{w}\|^2 =$$

$$2(\|\vec{v}\|^2 + \|\vec{w}\|^2) \quad \checkmark$$

$$\textcircled{2} \quad (\vec{v} \times \vec{w}) \cdot (\vec{v} \times \vec{w}) =$$

$$\|\vec{v} \times \vec{w}\| \cdot \|\vec{v} \times \vec{w}\| = \quad (\text{using } \vec{a} \cdot \vec{a} = \|\vec{a}\|^2 = \|\vec{a}\| \cdot \|\vec{a}\|)$$

$$(\|\vec{v}\| \|\vec{w}\| \sin \theta) (\|\vec{v}\| \|\vec{w}\| \sin \theta) =$$

$$\|\vec{v}\|^2 \|\vec{w}\|^2 \sin^2 \theta =$$

$$\|\vec{v}\|^2 \|\vec{w}\|^2 (1 - \cos^2 \theta) =$$

$$\|\vec{v}\|^2 \|\vec{w}\|^2 - (\|\vec{v}\| \|\vec{w}\| \cos \theta) (\|\vec{v}\| \|\vec{w}\| \cos \theta) =$$

$$(\vec{v} \cdot \vec{v})(\vec{w} \cdot \vec{w}) - (\vec{v} \cdot \vec{w})(\vec{v} \cdot \vec{w}) =$$

$$(\vec{v} \cdot \vec{v})(\vec{w} \cdot \vec{w}) - (\vec{v} \cdot \vec{w})^2$$

$$\textcircled{3} \quad A(3, 1, -1), B(2, 0, 1), C(1, -2, 0)$$

$\Delta ABC$  is half of the parallelogram spanned by  $\vec{AB}$  and  $\vec{AC}$ , whose area is the magnitude of  $\vec{AB} \times \vec{AC}$ .

$$\|\vec{AB} \times \vec{AC}\| = \|\vec{AB}\| \cdot \|\vec{AC}\| \cdot \sin \theta, \quad \|\vec{AB}\| = \|\langle -1, -1, 2 \rangle\| = \sqrt{6}$$

$$\|\vec{AC}\| = \|\langle -2, -3, 1 \rangle\| = \sqrt{14}$$

To find  $\sin \theta$ , we use the dot product:

$$\vec{AB} \cdot \vec{AC} = \|\vec{AB}\| \cdot \|\vec{AC}\| \cos \theta$$

$$2 + 3 + 2 = \sqrt{6} \cdot \sqrt{14} \cdot \cos \theta$$

$$7 = \sqrt{84} \cdot \cos \theta$$

$$\frac{7}{\sqrt{84}} = \cos \theta$$

$$\frac{7}{\sqrt{84}} = \cos \theta, \quad \text{so } \sin \theta = \sqrt{\frac{35}{84}} = \sqrt{\frac{5}{12}}$$

$$\|\vec{AB} \times \vec{AC}\| = \sqrt{6} \cdot \sqrt{14} \cdot \sqrt{\frac{5}{12}}$$

$$= \sqrt{\frac{6 \cdot 14 \cdot 5}{12}}$$

$$= \sqrt{35}$$

Since  $\Delta ABC$  is half of the parallelogram,

$$\text{area of } \Delta ABC = \frac{1}{2} \sqrt{35}$$

# Worksheet # 1 Solutions

⑤ (a)  $\vec{i} \cdot \vec{j} = \|\vec{i}\| \cdot \|\vec{j}\| \cdot \cos \theta$ ,  $\theta = 90^\circ$ ,  $\|\vec{i}\| = 1$ ,  $\|\vec{j}\| = 1$   
 $= 1 \cdot 1 \cdot 0$   
 $= 0$

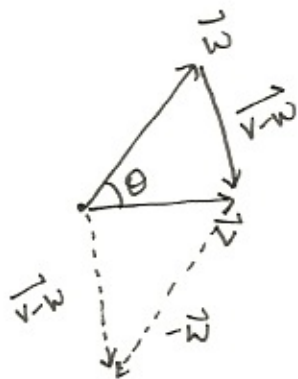
Similarly,  $\vec{i} \cdot \vec{k} = 0$ ,  $\vec{j} \cdot \vec{k} = 0$ .

$\vec{i} \cdot \vec{i} = \|\vec{i}\| \cdot \|\vec{i}\| \cdot \cos \theta$ ,  $\theta = 0^\circ$   
 $= 1 \cdot 1 \cdot 1$   
 $= 1$

Similarly,  $\vec{j} \cdot \vec{j} = 1$ ,  $\vec{k} \cdot \vec{k} = 1$ .

(b)  $\vec{v} \cdot \vec{w} = (v_1 \vec{i} + v_2 \vec{j} + v_3 \vec{k}) \cdot (w_1 \vec{i} + w_2 \vec{j} + w_3 \vec{k})$   
 $= v_1 w_1 (\vec{i} \cdot \vec{i}) + v_1 w_2 (\vec{i} \cdot \vec{j}) + v_1 w_3 (\vec{i} \cdot \vec{k}) + v_2 w_1 (\vec{j} \cdot \vec{i}) + v_2 w_2 (\vec{j} \cdot \vec{j})$   
 $+ v_2 w_3 (\vec{j} \cdot \vec{k}) + v_3 w_1 (\vec{k} \cdot \vec{i}) + v_3 w_2 (\vec{k} \cdot \vec{j}) + v_3 w_3 (\vec{k} \cdot \vec{k})$   
 $= v_1 w_1 \cdot 1 + 0 + 0 + 0 + v_2 w_2 \cdot 1 + 0 + 0 + 0 + v_3 w_3 \cdot 1$   
 $= v_1 w_1 + v_2 w_2 + v_3 w_3 \checkmark$

⑥ (a)



(b) Law of Cosines:

$$c^2 = a^2 + b^2 - 2ab \cos \theta$$

$$\|\vec{v}-\vec{w}\|^2 = \|\vec{v}\|^2 + \|\vec{w}\|^2 - 2\|\vec{v}\|\|\vec{w}\|\cos \theta$$

(c)  $\|\vec{v}-\vec{w}\|^2 = (\vec{v}-\vec{w}) \cdot (\vec{v}-\vec{w})$ ,  $\|\vec{v}\|^2 = \vec{v} \cdot \vec{v}$ , and  $\|\vec{w}\|^2 = \vec{w} \cdot \vec{w}$ , so the equation from (b) becomes:

$$(\vec{v}-\vec{w}) \cdot (\vec{v}-\vec{w}) = \vec{v} \cdot \vec{v} + \vec{w} \cdot \vec{w} - 2\|\vec{v}\|\|\vec{w}\|\cos \theta$$

$$\vec{v} \cdot \vec{v} - \vec{v} \cdot \vec{w} - \vec{w} \cdot \vec{v} + \vec{w} \cdot \vec{w} = \vec{v} \cdot \vec{v} + \vec{w} \cdot \vec{w} - 2\|\vec{v}\|\|\vec{w}\|\cos \theta$$

$$-2\vec{v} \cdot \vec{w} = -2\|\vec{v}\|\|\vec{w}\|\cos \theta$$

$$\vec{v} \cdot \vec{w} = \|\vec{v}\|\|\vec{w}\|\cos \theta \checkmark$$

⑦  $\vec{v} \cdot \vec{w} = v_1 w_1 + v_2 w_2 + v_3 w_3$  is easier when we are given coordinates, while the other is easier if we know the angle between them.
